What have we learned with Covid-19?

Don't you wish that this virus would have been a blizzard? Let's pretend we had 24 inches of snow. We might be stranded in our homes. We might be stuck eating our own food; I don't mind that at all, but some do. Our backs may be sore from shoveling, for those of us who do not have a snow blower. Our hands may have developed callouses. We might miss a few days of work. All our activities may be cancelled. In the end, we camp out inside for a few days (unless you're a farmer). Then, it's over.

Listen to what Elihu tells Job about snow, "He (God) says to the snow, 'Fall on the earth,' and to the rain shower, 'Be a mighty downpour.' So that all men he has made may know his work, he stops every man from his labor" (Job 37:6-7). Why does God send the snow? He desires all people to know the work of God. How can God get people to know his work? He stops our labor.

The virus and snow are two different things. Why does God allow the virus? Ultimately, you must say it is God's sovereignty. Yes, our free will may have been part of its creation and may be part of its spread, but God has allowed it. And, yes, sickness and death entered the

world with our sin. How can God get people to know his work? He stops our labor.

While we are stopped, what should we learn?

Who is in charge? We humans are not in charge, but God is. We don't know how the virus began or how it will end. Quite frankly, it sounds like a plague from the Old Testament or that which is promised in the last days of Revelation 6:8. God allows these events to occur to remind us of who we are not; we are not God. To paraphrase Dr. Os Guinness recently stated that "the loss of control is at the heart of the fear caused by the pandemic. We have no control, though Westerners are control freaks."

What is our view of death? Do we recognize our mortality? We will all die. Do we know what happens after death? Do we know the source of eternal life?

What occupies our soul? It is when we have "free" time that we learn what we love. That is the focus of our soul. What we fill our time with shows what we value. Think about this: Who or what is on the throne of your heart?"

Are we walking in humility? AP News had an interesting article, "Coronavirus Shakes the Conceit of 'American Exceptionalism.'" We are self-absorbed as individuals and as a nation. The article focused on the pride we have

of our medical technology, but it revealed the shortfalls of our medical system at this time: the shortages, the inconsistent decision making, and the lack of preparation.

On a personal basis, have you purchased all the toilet paper so that no one else may have any? Or, are you so haughty to think you would never get the virus? Beware! Even more, are you secretly, or not so secretly, angry at the government for them telling you to stay at home? How dare they? Facebook reveals that the spirit of rebellion is alive and well in the United States; we were founded on that spirit.

Yet, “rebellion is like the sin of divination and arrogance like the evil of idolatry” (1 Samuel 15:23).

No organization can thrive with a spirit of rebellion.

Instead, “**Are we praying for our government leaders?**” As I was exploring a quote from Pres.

Bush during 9/11 last week, I found these words of his in the Guardian, “There is no textbook on how to steady a nation rattled by a faceless enemy.” He is referring to the terrorist attack that just occurred and not the faceless enemy of a virus. Unfortunately, this virus has become politicized. Rather than joining a side, let’s pray for wisdom and guidance and humility before God for our leaders.

What is the church? If you haven’t noticed, the church is not a building. We haven’t met in the building since March and the church continues. We have met by Zoom. We worshiped by Facebook

Live. We have made and received calls, emails, Instagrams and even cards or letters by snail mail. I even got to see some people, can you believe it, in person! The church is people united in Jesus Christ. **Are our hearts hurting for the broken?** People are grieving. They have lost loved ones. They have lost their health. They have lost jobs. Some have lost incomes. They have lost businesses. They have lost their freedom to move. Much loss leads to much grief. Ask the Holy Spirit to keep your heart and your eyes and your ears open to ways you may serve.

So, what did you learn? Schools may be closed, but you can still learn. Use these questions to let the Holy Spirit teach you.

This is your May Spiritual Exercise. Use this “stay at home” time to answer those questions for yourself or with the help of others.

Dr. Os Guinness stated in a recent webinar that he prays these words almost daily, “Lord, teach us to count our days so we can make our days count.”



ORVILLE & CHERYL HADE UPDATE

Dear Prayer Partners,

As we all know much has changed since our March 18 update, due to the impact of the corona-virus. So, we will give a brief update as follows:

1. In Cabo Delgado, the BIC church communities that were under threat from militants, the people returned to their homes recently. However, the situation there is very unstable and the people live day to day with the risk of needing to flee their homes again. Per various reports the militants are continuing to geographically expand their activities. Please continue to pray that peaceful resolution may be found.
2. Both Cheryl and I remain well and are taking increasing measures of social distancing and virus mitigation. Yet, at the same time, we are ministering in various limited ways.
3. To the best of our knowledge, although with very limited testing available in Mozambique, the C virus has not yet had a big impact here. The government has taken steps to restrict group meetings and issued various guidelines. However, we all must live with the reality of things not being certain without testing available.
4. Danny, a short-term missionary with the Reformed Church arrived here in Milange on March 14 from South Africa. He spent one night at our house and then traveled to Nampula for several days. Upon his return he was sick with symptoms like the flu or corona-virus. He self-isolated himself in a nearby house. The local medical staff said he must be there for 14 days. During this time we have helped him with meals and various things he needed. He expects to leave isolation any day, but he plans to stay in Milange until he is permitted to return to South Africa.

Note: Danny was able to bring some much needed parts for our truck from South Africa. However, due to virus issues, we have been unable to travel to our mechanic in Blantyre.

5. Cheryl and I continue to look for ways to "do the good we can do", while also following govt guidelines, and good health practices. We need your prayers for wisdom on all things.

Ongoing prayer needs:

- a. Supt Francisco - for fully recovery from his head injury
- b. New church constitution and registration: just as we began working with the Maputo lawyer, the virus impact sidetracked things again
- c. DIRE for Cheryl: not yet arrived

Orville's mom, Margaret Hade (Walker), 91 years old, husband was Donald C. Hade, peacefully passed away April 25th. She had very recently been diagnosed with corona virus. Please pray for Orville's four siblings as they work together to make funeral plans, etc., while we are here in Mozambique.

We are looking into creative ways for meeting new people and building relationships that lead to life transformation. Pray for us to have wisdom and guidance from above, and divine appointments for interacting with people.

Jason meets regularly with Anthony. We praise God for his openness to learn. Pray that Anthony would remember what he's learning and that he would develop creative ways to share the gospel with others.

COVID-19

The Coronavirus continues to infect many people in our region. The Navajo Nation has been particularly hit hard, it's considered a major hot spot in the nation. Nightly and weekend curfews have been implemented across the Navajo Nation, unfortunately many citations have been issued to people not obeying the law.

Pray for healthcare workers who are tirelessly working to care for people. Many of them are isolating themselves from their families out of safety concerns. Pray for our Navajo friend Lenora who hasn't physically seen her special needs son in several weeks, it's been hard for him to understand why his mother can't come home.

Pray for people to respect authority figures and do as they are asked to, even when they don't feel like it.

Pray for the spread of the virus to slow down and for people to have peace in the midst of pain and sorrow. A member of a local church we're connected with recently lost her mother and brother because of the virus. It was heartbreaking that the family couldn't gather together for a funeral.

MOTHERS DAY AND HOW IT ALL BEGAN

The official Mother's Day holiday arose in the 1900s as a result of the efforts of Anna Jarvis, daughter of Ann Reeves Jarvis. Following her mother's 1905 death, Anna Jarvis conceived of Mother's Day as a way of honoring the sacrifices mothers made for their children.

After gaining financial backing from a Philadelphia department store owner named John Wanamaker, in May 1908 she organized the first official Mother's Day celebration at a Methodist church in Grafton, West Virginia. That same day also saw thousands of people attend a Mother's Day event at one of Wanamaker's retail stores in Philadelphia.

Following the success of her first Mother's Day, Jarvis—who remained unmarried and childless her whole life—resolved to see her holiday added to the national calendar. Arguing that American holidays were biased toward male achievements, she started a massive letter writing campaign to newspapers and prominent politicians urging the adoption of a special day honoring motherhood.

By 1912 many states, towns and churches had adopted Mother's Day as an annual holiday, and Jarvis had established the Mother's Day International Association to help promote her cause. Her persistence paid off in 1914 when President Woodrow Wilson signed a measure officially establishing the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day.

Jarvis Decries Commercialized Mother's Day

Anna Jarvis had originally conceived of Mother's Day as a day of personal celebration between mothers and families. Her version of the day involved wearing a white carnation as a badge and visiting one's mother or attending church services. But once Mother's Day became a national holiday, it was not long before florists, card companies and other merchants capitalized on its popularity.

While Jarvis had initially worked with the floral industry to help raise Mother's Day's profile, by 1920 she had become disgusted with how the holiday had been commercialized. She outwardly denounced the transformation and urged people to stop buying Mother's Day flowers, cards and candies.

Jarvis eventually resorted to an open campaign against Mother's Day profiteers, speaking out against confectioners, florists and even charities. She also launched countless lawsuits against groups that had used the name "Mother's Day," eventually spending most of her personal wealth in legal fees. By the time of her death in 1948 Jarvis had disowned the holiday altogether, and even actively lobbied the government to see it removed from the American calendar.
